Superintendent's Update



Dear Kentfield Community,

It is remarkable how little makes it into the "irreplaceable" pile when you hurriedly pack up your home to evacuate ahead of fires. While we in Sebastopol are not in imminent danger, we did not know that on Monday at 4:30 a.m. when the alerts started coming through on our phones. The back of our truck remains packed with mostly photo albums and handmade treasures such as quilts, journals, and clothing, just in case the winds shift. Even then, we could absolutely live without any of it. We had the luxury of thinking and planning for a few hours. We have friends and family who literally got out with the clothes they were wearing and their pets and for that they are grateful. It's an uncertain time, but what is never in doubt is the primacy of safety and the irreplaceability of life.

I have been participating in calls all week with Marin County officials who are advising us on air quality and other critical concerns. As you now know, the decision has been made to close all schools in Marin County tomorrow, Friday, October 13 ([MCOE Press Release](#)). We plan to return to normal operations on Monday.

I will close by reiterating what I wrote earlier this week: you never know what the person next to you is coping with. That makes it an even better time than usual to be kind and patient and to extend the benefit of the doubt to friends, acquaintances, and strangers alike.

District Lockdown

Bacich and Kent were forced to lock down for a brief time this afternoon due to the pursuit by law enforcement of a suspect who was seen on Sir Francis Drake Boulevard going through mailboxes. The suspect ran when approached and came through the Kent campus. Officers were in pursuit and when they saw that our students were out for recess, they called for a lockdown of the school. Bacich

locked down at that point as well.

The officers stated that we were never in danger but for safety, asked that everyone stay inside until it was clear. However, they never apprehended the suspect, who was last seen going east along the bike path. He was a white male, 20-30 years old, with a hat and ponytail.

Board Meeting Highlights

At its meeting on Tuesday, the School Board enjoyed a report on our Libraries. The instruction on genres that teacher librarian Susan Warnick provides at Bacich was ably described by former students Julia Bouligny, Chloe Branson, Hailey Carlton, Tessa Delay, Emily Garcia, Jasmine Li, Andreah Rodriguez, and Sophia Rubel. Kent teacher librarian Rebecca Jelen and students Berit Pigott, MacLean Marsten, Aaron Addis, and Ethan Werner spoke about and illustrated the variety of activities available for students in the Kent Library. We were all infected by the enthusiasm of the teachers and students for the wonders of school libraries.

The Board received updates on the Measure D bond work at Kent, which is largely proceeding on schedule. There is a delay at the state permitting level that is slowing the plans for renovating the current office into classroom space. Our architect is working to move that along. Looking ahead, the planning for Bacich's year of construction (2018-19) has begun. The Board will discuss the many challenges anticipated during this time, including temporary classroom needs, at its November meeting.

Charles Heath and Bryan Godbe, parcel tax and polling consultants, presented the results of the recent survey conducted in our district to assess numerous variables related to our next parcel tax measure. The Board directed the Superintendent to work with Mr. Heath and district counsel on a ballot measure and resolution for the Board to consider at its November meeting. The plan is to request voters approve a 10-year renewal of our current parcel tax with an increase of \$355/year with all applicable exemptions and a 3% annual escalator on the March, 2018 ballot. Sarah Killingsworth and John Holzwarth were announced as the co-chairs of the campaign to pass the parcel tax measure.

The Superintendent presented a [report](#) on the results of last spring's [CAASPP testing](#) of our 3rd through 8th graders. Our students' performance was consistent with what was seen across the state. There were no significant increases nor decreases but we now have three years of information to work with and are formulating plans to address student groups and grade levels that need targeted assistance. We also are taking the opportunity to develop a customized data system that facilitates more precise tracking of all student progress and operationalizing our LCAP goals utilizing 2017 data. Through this, we will implement plans to accelerate and elevate individual student performance.

Sir Francis Drake Boulevard Rehabilitation Project

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (Draft EIR) has been completed for the Sir Francis Drake Boulevard (SFD) Rehabilitation project. The project involves various modifications to the SFD corridor between Highway 101 and the Ross Town Limits.

To date, members of our KSD Safe Routes team have been very active on this project and we have been pleased to see many exciting safety enhancements included as a result of our advocacy efforts. You all know our neighborhood best and where safety issues need to be addressed on SFD. We encourage you to learn about this important project and give feedback. The public review and comment period for the Draft EIR continues through Wednesday, December 6, 2017. Comments may be made the following ways:

Bacich Elementary School



Dear Bacich Families,

In light of the tragic fires happening in our neighboring communities, this week's Parent Bulletin seems particularly timely and important. While we prepare in our schools for what we hope will never happen, our thoughts are with those who have experienced loss and heartbreak during these past few days.

Next Thursday, October 19th, both Bacich and Kent School will participate in our annual all-school Emergency Evacuation Drills. These comprehensive and carefully coordinated school drills will provide students and staff with opportunities to practice emergency scenarios and procedures, while following carefully outlined plans and practices.

Bacich and Kent have an extensive and detailed Emergency Preparedness Plans in place, which the schools will follow in the event of a school emergency. We practice drills consistently throughout the school year in the event that we would need to respond to a lock-down, a fire, an earthquake, or other natural disaster. These comprehensive plans incorporate the Kentfield School District Board Policies and Administrative Regulations.

Our schools work very closely with our local police and fire departments to evaluate our safety measures and we update them as necessary. School procedures such as doors that lock from the inside, keys or fobs to access school gates, student bathroom buddies, blinds to cover classroom windows, and visitor sign-in/sign-out protocols are some of the many safety routines that we have in place.

The [Kentfield School District Safety Committee](#) meets regularly to understand the current safety concerns within the schools and in the neighborhoods surrounding the schools. Our students participate in the [Safe Routes to Schools](#) programs, which focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Each fall, the district hosts First Aid and CPR refresher training for the teaching staff and the teachers are trained in how to use fire extinguishers, in the event they are needed. Every day, the Bacich office staff accounts for every student on our campus and the yard duty personnel are strategically placed on campus to monitor student safety.

We appreciate everyone's efforts and attention to the rules and precautions that we have in place on our campus. Our work is never finished in trying to keep our campus secure and our children safe during our school day.

Dear Kent Families,

This week has been a poignant one for perspective. With the raging fires north of us and the smoke filling our air, we have been reminded that life is fragile and precious.

We have staff members who have been directly affected by these destructive fires and we are certain many of you all have felt this loss. Our hearts are with all who are battling these horrible conditions and we will do what we can to help once that information becomes more clear from the Sonoma and Napa authorities. Currently, our PTA is organizing a [Love In A Backpack](#) donation drive for students who have evacuated their homes.

At Kent, we elected our class representatives for Student Council and they had their first meeting today. It is encouraging to see so many Falcons stepping up to make a difference. We also held "Nightmare on Puberty Street" for the 7th and 8th graders. This is an engaging performance from Kaiser Hospital that helps these kids navigate this confusing age.

Today, we completed the second of our Principal Chats. This year we chose to assist parents in helping their children with computer programs such as Pearson Math, PowerSchool, Quizlet, Google Classroom, and Alexandra. Parents who attended were able to access their student's website and were guided by teachers in how to better support their student at home. I am aware that many of you are working and were unable to attend. We are currently working with our 8th grade Journalism students to create a "how to" video for parents who are interested in getting this information. It's a work in progress and parents will be sent a link when we have it working properly.

Finally, we've been made aware of parents dropping their kids off on College Ave. in front of the school. At times, parents are not even bothering to pull to the side of the road and the kids are hopping out of cars while the parent driver waits at the red light before the entrance to the school. Not only is it dangerous, it's inconsiderate to everyone else who is driving. Parents doing this are holding up traffic and putting their kids in extreme danger. Please take the time to drop your child off, either in the Kent parking lot down by the Gymnasium or find a safe place in the College of Marin or the Woodlands parking lots to have your students

cross College with the crossing guard. We are hoping that this behavior stops and students are safe when coming to school.


